WHAT IS THE GLOBAL SCHOOL ON REFUGEE AND MIGRANT HEALTH?

When people move from their homes and countries, they may face many challenges – including access to basic rights, such as health care.

The WHO's Department of Health and Migration is supporting countries to address health needs and rights for all people on the move, through its **Global School on Refugee and Migrant Health**.

The health needs and rights of refugees and migrants require culturally sensitive and effective care that recognizes both the impact of migration on physical and mental health and the various barriers hampering the availability, accessibility, acceptability and affordability of health services for these populations.

The Global School – a flagship five-day course hosted in different WHO regions each year – is an opportunity for governments, United Nations agencies, researchers, nongovernmental organizations and civil society, including refugees and migrants, to come together to share country experience and knowledge, outline good practices, identify gaps and collectively pave the way ahead, leaving no one behind.

With attendance online and in person, the Global School programme is made up of five 90-minute modules over five consecutive days, each addressing a sub-thematic area. Opened by high-level speakers such as the WHO Director-General, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and the Director-General of the International Organization for Migration, the Global School also features:



- Each Global School is a collaborative effort, led by WHO headquarters and involving WHO regional and country offices

How it is run



Hybrid (online and in-person)



Open to everyone, but the main target audience includes policy-makers, health sector managers and officers working at different levels within ministries in charge of the interior, labour, social affairs, foreign affairs, health and education



The faculty of the Global School consists of international experts, representatives from WHO and other United Nations agencies, and field experts



Five modules, 90 minutes each, run over five days (from Monday to Friday), addressing five sub-thematic areas, related to the overarching theme



Guiding principles of the Global School

- Educational approach
- Focus on sharing country experiences
- Promote active interaction among participants, giving relevant space to Q&A sessions
- Promote WHO regional and country offices' collaboration in planning and implementing the programme
- Establish linkage between research institutes and WHO and other regional, national and local organizations for initiating refugee and migrant health-focused research to support evidence-informed interventions

The Global School aligns with priorities one to four of WHO's Global action plan on promoting the health of refugees and migrants, 2023-2030



1. Promote the health of refugees and migrants through a mix of short-term and long-term public health interventions.



2. Promote continuity and quality of essential health care, while developing, reinforcing and implementing occupational health and safety measures.



3. Advocate the mainstreaming of refugee and migrant health into global, regional and country agendas and the promotion of: refugee-sensitive and migrant-sensitive health policies and legal and social protection; the health and well-being of refugee and migrant women, children and adolescents; gender equality and empowerment of refugee and migrant women and girls; and partnerships and intersectoral, intercountry and interagency coordination and collaboration mechanisms.



4. Enhance capacity to tackle the social determinants of health and to accelerate progress towards achieving the SDGs, including universal health coverage.



5. Strengthen health monitoring and health information systems.




6. Support measures to improve evidence-informed health communication and to counter misperceptions about migrant and refugee health.



The WHO's Department of Health and Migration brings together WHO's technical departments, regional and country offices, as well as partners, to secure the health rights of refugees and migrants and achieve universal health coverage. To this end, the Department has five core functions:

- Provide global leadership, high-level advocacy, coordination and policy on health and migration
- Monitor trends, strengthen health information systems and promote tools and strategies
- Promote global multilateral action and collaboration

- Set norms and standards to support decision-making
- Provide specialized technical assistance, response and capacity-building support to address public health challenges associated with human mobility
