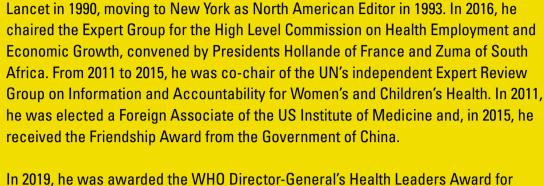

Richard Horton is Editor-in-Chief of The Lancet. He qualified in physiology and medicine with honours from the University of Birmingham in 1986. He joined The

outstanding leadership in global health and the Roux Prize in recognition of innovation in the application of global health evidence. In 2021, he received the Physicians for Human Rights Award in recognition of extraordinary leadership in advancing health and human rights.

He now works to develop the idea of planetary health – the health of human civilizations and the ecosystems on which they depend. In 2020, he published The COVID-19 Catastrophe: What's Gone Wrong and How to Stop It Happening Again. A revised, updated, and expanded second edition was published in 2021.

Nigel Rollins joined the Department of Maternal, Newborn, Child and Adolescent Health of WHO in July 2008. He trained as a pediatrician in Belfast, Northern Ireland and his work focuses on interventions to improve child survival, growth and development. This includes implementation research to improve coverage and quality of care and also the prevention of mother-to-child transmission of HIV and infant feeding.

Prior to joining WHO, Dr. Rollins was Professor and head of the Centre for Maternal and Child Health at the University of KwaZulu-Natal (UKZN), Durban, South Africa, where he lived and worked for 14 years.

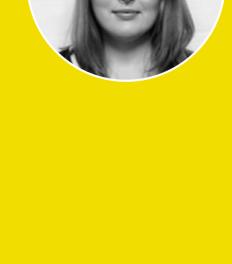

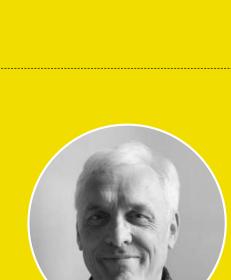
