Biographies Speakers




Guy Fones, is the Director a.i, WHO, UCN/NCD. He received his MD from the University of Chile in 1991 and has, since then, gained more than 30 years' experience and achievements in public, private and global health platforms, including his 15-year clinical practice as both 'Ear, Nose and Throat' and 'Emergency Medicine' specialist in Chile.

Guy cemented his expertise in Global Health Diplomacy as Health Attaché for the Permanent Mission of Chile to the United Nations Organizations in Geneva where, for 6 years, he gained solid experience in multilateral and stakeholder governance for health, global policy consensus-building and forging strategic pro-health partnerships bridging national, regional and global multistakeholder interests.

Guy joined WHO in 2015 the Global Coordination Mechanism for NCDs, which he led from 2019-2024, supporting WHO's work on multistakeholder and cross-sectoral engagement, knowledge sharing, capacity building and partnerships for NCDs.

In July 2024, Dr Fones joined the NCD Department as Cross Cutting Lead, Strategy, with a focus on supporting an integrated approach to the achievement of SDG 3.4 on NCDs at country level, including now, as acting Director, NCD, main focal point for the preparatory process towards the 4th United Nations High-Level Meeting (UN HLM) on NCDs 2025.



André Ilbawi is a surgical oncologist and serves as the Lead for the Cancer Programme at WHO Headquarters in Geneva. Since joining WHO in 2015, he has been responsible for implementing the 2017 World Health Assembly resolution on cancer prevention and control. Dr Ilbawi has led the launch of key initiatives such as the WHO Global Initiative for Childhood Cancer (2018) and the WHO Global Breast Cancer Initiative (2021). He has also contributed to major WHO publications, including the 2020 WHO Report on Cancer, and has developed tools for cancer control and capacity building.



Samuel Sieber, PhD, is a senior knowledge translation specialist and communication advisor with the Global Coordination Mechanism on NCDs at the World Health Organization (WHO), based in Italy. He holds a PhD in Media Studies and several years of experience in facilitating evidence-informed decision-making, strategic communication and stakeholder engagement with several UN and international humanitarian INGOs. Currently leading the development and stakeholder engagement of the WHO Knowledge Action Portal on NCDs (KAP).






Mary Nyangasi joined the WHO in January 2024 as the Technical lead for the Global Breast Cancer Initiative at WHO, Headquarters, Geneva, where is focused on implementation of the GBCI and supports the integration of women's cancers into national cancer control planning. She is a medical doctor and public health specialist in epidemiology and disease control with extensive experience spanning 13 years in various aspects of oncology. As the immediate former Head of the National Cancer Control Program in Kenya, she led the establishment of regional cancer centres, scale-up of cervical and breast cancer screening and early diagnosis, formulation and implementation of cancer policies, strategies and guidelines. She has published in various peer-reviewed journals.



Gloria Chinyere Okwu is the Programme Coordinator at Project PINK BLUE, Nigeria, and a breast cancer survivor. She has over seven years of experience in program management, non-profit work, global advocacy, and multisectoral engagements. Gloria is also a creative writer, patient navigator, public speaker, and an executive member of various support groups in Nigeria.



Neha Goel, Surgical Oncologist, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, USA. Dr Goel is a triple board-certified surgical oncologist, Associate Attending Surgeon and Chief of Disparities in the Department of Surgery at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center (MSK), and an Associate Professor of Surgery at Weill Medical College of Cornell Medical University, with clinical expertise in the multidisciplinary management of breast cancer. She has extensive experience in breast cancer disparities, health policy, and social epidemiology research. She also worked as an Associate Editor for the WHO GBCI Implementation Framework and Editor for the GBCI Patient Navigation Technical Brief. Dr Goel is also an NIH funded researcher who established and leads the Miami Breast Cancer Disparities Study, an epidemiologic cohort study, to map genomic and non-genomic pathways of breast cancer disparities.



Benjamin Anderson is Professor Emeritus of Surgery and Global Health Medicine at the University of Washington and served as Surgical Director of the UW Breast Health Clinic from 1994 to 2020. He has over 25 years of experience in global cancer control and chaired the Breast Health Global Initiative, developing resource-stratified guidelines for low- and middle-income countries. Dr Anderson joined the WHO in 2020 to lead the Global Breast Cancer Initiative and now serves as Global Technical Lead for Breast Cancer at City Cancer Challenge Foundation. He has received multiple awards, including ASCO's Partners in Progress Award and ESO's Umberto Veronesi Memorial Award.









