- Explored the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on patient safety in terms of risks and avoidable harm, specifically in terms of diagnostic, treatment and care management
- 2. Established the main patterns of these implications within the broader health system context
- Developed methodology with experts and scientific advisers

10 key lessons learned about patient safety during the COVID-19 pandemic

- We now know much more about the pandemic-related safety gaps across all core components of health systems, at all levels
- Greater understanding is still needed about the risks and magnitude of avoidable harm from the COVID-19 pandemic
- 3. Disruptions to systems and processes of care accentuated known safety risks and harm in health care and introduced new ones
- 4. Loss of capacity of health systems necessary to preserve essential health services had negative implications for patient safety
- Managing COVID-19 in countries experiencing fragility, conflict and violence added to the complexity of major existing challenges

- 6. The pandemic led to avoidable, direct harm to hundreds of thousands of health workers around the world
- 7. Misinformation and disinformation during the pandemic have, at times, obstructed the delivery of safe care
- 8. The pandemic exposed long-standing health inequities impacting patient safety
- Lack of interaction between patients' families and health workers, together with exclusion from decision-making had very adverse consequences
- 10. Most consequences of the pandemic were negative for patient safety, but the positive developments must not be ignored
